NARRATIVE HOOKS - OPENINGS

- A STATE OF THE STA
- The following are typical ways to start a story:
- Start with something very odd

Vse direct speech

Start in the middle of something

Make the reader laugh

Talk to the reader: use first person narrative

Shock the reader

Create a tense atmosphere

Create a very clear picture
